All Research Groups: Past Deadlines

BBSRC: Follow-on Fund

The Biotechnology and Biological Sciences Research Council invites proposals for projects supported by the research council follow-on fund. The fund aims to increase the level and accelerate the rate of commercialisation of ideas arising from the research council community. The scheme supports further scientific or technical development and other activities essential to securing commercial opportunities such as licensing, seed or venture finance. Applications for follow-on grants must fall within the remit of BBSRC and will draw substantially on the outputs of the council's recent research funding. Individual grants will be typically in the range of $\pounds 90,000$ to $\pounds 100,000$ (awarded at 80 per cent of full economic cost value) over a period of up to 12 months. The fund is open to academics in UK universities and research council institutes to take forward ideas generated by funding from BBSRC.

European Research Council: Starting independent researcher grants – physical science and engineering

The European Commission has launched a call for proposals for European Research Council starting independent researcher grants. The grants will provide support to the independent careers of researchers located in the EU and associated countries. These researchers should be establishing or leading their first research team or programme.

Grants will support projects carried out by teams which are headed by a single principal investigator and will be awarded to the institution hosting the PI. The scheme is open to researchers of any nationality who would like to set their research activity up in any European Union member state or associated country. The physical science and engineering research domain will receive 39 percent of the overall indicative budget of 295.762 million euros for the SIRG programme.

Wellcome Trust: Engaging Science: People Awards

Projects are worth up to £30,000 each and have a maximum duration of three years. Eligible activities include workshops, talks, discussions, and exhibitions in public venues; deliberative or opinion-gathering projects.

People Awards enable you to explore the impact of biomedical science on society, its historical roots, effects on different cultures, or the ethical questions that it brings, by supporting activities such as events, debates, exhibitions, art projects and drama productions related to biomedical science.

We aim to encourage people of all ages and from all walks of life to consider, question and debate the key issues of now and the future. We want people to be informed, inspired and involved.

People Awards support projects that aim to achieve at least one of the following:

- stimulate interest, excitement and debate about biomedical science through various methods
- support formal and informal learning about biomedical science
- reach new audiences not normally engaged with biomedical science, as well as continuing to target existing audiences
- examine the social, cultural, historical and ethical impact of biomedical science

- encourage new ways of thinking about biomedical science
- encourage high quality interdisciplinary practice and collaborative partnerships
- investigate and test new methods of engagement, participation and education.

EPSRC: Leadership fellowship

The Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council has issued a call for outline proposals under its leadership fellowship programme. The awards provide up to five years funding to talented early or mid-career researchers with the most potential to develop into the UK's international research leaders of tomorrow. They offer an opportunity to concentrate on research for the period of the award, as well as supporting the cost of associated research for the full duration of the fellowship. The expectation is that fellows will have established themselves as leading researchers of international standing in their area by the end of the award, as well as demonstrating leadership within their institution and research community.

The awards allow fellows to follow new research directions and build collaborations internationally, within and across disciplines. Fellows will also be expected to contribute to the uptake of research outputs for economic and social impact through appropriate knowledge exchange activities.

Applications are welcome across the breadth of EPSRC's remit. In addition, EPSRC has highlighted the following research themes where applications are particularly encouraged: energy; towards next generation healthcare; nanosciences through engineering to application; digital economy.

To be eligible for the scheme candidates must currently hold a permanent UK academic post. The award will cover costs related to the programme of research, as well as the fellow's personal expenses, that is salary, travel and subsistence costs. The fellow's host organisation must be a UK higher education institution eligible to apply for research grants.

NERC: Follow-on fund

These funds will help scientists to develop research ideas to a stage where commercial opportunities (eg licensing, seed or equity funds) can be secured. Funds can support further scientific and technical development of an idea though applications may involve some activities towards improving an intellectual property position, market research or investigating potential licensees and joint ventures.

Medical Research Council and Department of Health: Methodology research programme

•methods for the design and analysis of primary descriptive and evaluative studies;

•the design, process and analysis of clinical trials including improved methods for the assessment of risk, efficacy, safety and other issues related to regulatory approvals for new medicines, devices and diagnostics;

•methodologies in the applied disciplines underpinning research in the health science, for example, health economics, biostatistics and quantitative analysis, modelling, decision sciences, epidemiology, behavioural sciences and health psychology, qualitative analysis and mixed methods, medical sociology, organisational and management science and bioethics;

•the measurement and validation of health, health outcomes and satisfaction.

Boehringer Ingelheim Fund: PhD Studentships

Boehringer Ingelheim Fonds invites applications for its PhD scholarships for basic research aimed at acquiring new scientific knowledge. The foundation supports projects aimed to elucidate basic phenomena of human life. Applicants should not be older than 27 years of age. Natural scientists may apply after having submitted a diploma or equivalent thesis; physicians, veterinary surgeons and pharmacists should have passed state examinations. At the deadline the applicant should not have worked on their project for longer than six months. Nationality is irrelevant. European citizens are supported in Europe or overseas; non-European citizens receive support when working in Europe. Boehringer Ingelheim Fonds will award approximately 15 PhD scholarships per funding round. Each scholarship is granted for at least two years, with an option of renewal for a further 12 months. Irrespective of the scholar's age the basic monthly grant amounts to 1,400 euros. In Switzerland, in the US and the UK 500 euros are added as a compensation for purchasing power.

STFC: CASE-Plus studentships

The Science and Technology Facilities Council invites applications for its cooperative awards in science and engineering-Plus studentships. Case studentships are designed to give students experience outside a purely academic environment. They provide for training of a research student on a project which involves the joint supervision of the student by a member of staff at an academic institution and an employee of a UK industrial firm or an organisation in the public service. For the first three years of the award, CASE-Plus operates in the same way as the CASE scheme. The main difference is that the student spends a fourth year working full-time on the premises of the cooperating body as an employee. During this additional year, the student will receive a salary equivalent to that of a new STFC postdoctoral fellow. STFC will contribute 50 per cent of the salary costs incurred by the cooperating body, up to a maximum STFC contribution of £13,600. Moreover, students holding Case awards receive £615 per annum in addition to the basic maintenance allowance. Eligibility for a fourth year of support is dependent on the student demonstrating a level of achievement agreed in advance between the sponsor, the university and the student.

The expectation is that fellows will have established an independent career of international standing by the end of the award. The fellowships allow scientists to follow new research directions and build collaborations internationally, within and across disciplines. Fellows will also be expected to contribute to the uptake of research outputs for economic and social impact through appropriate knowledge exchange activities.

Proposals are welcome across the breadth of the EPSRC remit. In addition, EPSRC has highlighted the following research themes where applications are particularly encouraged: energy; towards next generation healthcare; nanosciences through engineering to application.

To be eligible applicants must not: hold or have held a permanent UK academic post, or have been promised such a post before the start of the award. Candidates should hold a PhD or equivalent higher degree or have several years research experience at an equivalent level. They should have between three and 10 years postdoctoral research or relevant industrial experience by the start date of the fellowship.

The award will cover costs related to the programme of research, as well as the fellow's personal expenses, that is salary, travel and subsistence costs. The fellow's host organisation must be a UK higher education institution eligible for research council funding.

The international research networks formed through this call will be expected to operate for no longer than two years with EPSRC funding, after which time they should aim to become self-supporting. The total budget for this round of Interact is £500,000 and up to four awards will be made in 2008.

European Science Foundation: European collaborative research Eurocores scheme

The European Science Foundation is inviting proposals for its European collaborative research Eurocores scheme. The ESF expects to select approximately five theme proposals from this call for further development. The Eurocores scheme aims to enable researchers in different European countries to develop collaboration and scientific synergy in areas where European scale and scope are required for cutting-edge science in a global context. The scheme is intended to allow national funding organisations to join forces to support top class European research in and across all scientific areas, including humanities. Current Eurocores programmes are in the fields of materials, medical, humanities, bio-, geo- and environmental sciences.

Proposing groups can include scientists from at least four different countries within ESF membership or representatives from national funding organisations. A Eurocores programme should be able to attract 70 to 200 interested scientists and total research funding of at least 10 million euros over three to four years of funding. A theme proposal, if selected, will then be developed into an open call for research proposals.

•inspire future generations of researchers in engineering and the physical sciences;

•encourage public debate about the role of research in society and establish a dialogue between researchers and the public;

•build and sustain a community of researchers active in public engagement, including through partnerships, with the necessary expertise.

EPSRC is particularly interested in projects that not only increase the public's awareness of science and engineering, but also include some level of dialogue between members of the public and scientists or engineers, where this is appropriate.

The resources required should be estimated according to full economic costing. The majority of grants are expected to range between $\pounds 20,000$ and $\pounds 120,000$, but smaller or larger bids are welcome.

Applicants should normally hold or have held an EPSRC research grant or fellowship, and the research being communicated must fall within the EPSRC remit.

BBSRC: The ageing bladder and bowel

The Biotechnology and Biological Sciences Research Council and Research into Ageing wish to encourage more basic and translational research to increase understanding of the ageing bladder and bowel, and the processes that lead to incontinence, and thus to improve treatments and quality of life for older people.

Expressions of interest are therefore invited on one of the following themes: increasing understanding of the physiology of the ageing bladder and bowel; exploring preventative measures, treatments and diagnosis of urinary and faecal incontinence.

Proposals can be submitted to BBSRC or RiA and will be reviewed by the most appropriate funder. BBSRC's remit covers the biological basis of ageing, but not applied biomedical science. Thus applications addressing the second priority should be submitted to RiA for consideration for funding. The remit of RiA is broad, covering both basic and applied biomedical science. However, for this call, applications that are at the fundamental or theoretical end of the spectrum should be submitted to BBSRC (eg basic cellular mechanisms, signalling, muscle and nerve control, organ specific ageing, tissue engineering, model species, systems approaches/modelling). RiA will cover the more translational end, but also some underpinning science as appropriate.

Funding for this call is not ring-fenced and successful applications will be funded through BBSRC responsive mode funding or through the RiA grant schemes as appropriate.

South Africa-UK Science Networks

The Royal Society, in collaboration with the National Research Foundation, is inviting applications for its South Africa-UK science networks.
