The role

We invite applications for two Postdoctoral Research Associates in Infectious Disease Modelling to work with Professor Robin Thompson at the Mathematical Institute, University of Oxford. These are fixed-term positions for 24 months and 12 months, respectively, funded by the Biotechnology and Biological Sciences Research Council (BBSRC). We anticipate the start-date for this position to be in January 2026 but other start dates can be negotiated.

The successful candidates will be members of Prof. Thompson's research group within the Wolfson Biology Centre for Mathematical in the Mathematical Institute (https://www.maths.ox.ac.uk/groups/mathematical-biology/infectious-disease-modelling). postdoctoral researchers will develop data-driven mathematical models and associated computing code for modelling avian influenza outbreaks in Great Britain. One postdoctoral researcher will use models to investigate the risk of viral invasions in different locations at different times of year. The other postdoctoral research will test a range of intervention strategies. Both researchers will collaborate with members of the project team based elsewhere (at other UK universities and the UK government's Animal and Plant Health Agency). There will be a focus on writing computing code that can be used in future by other researchers and by animal health policy specialists.

The research undertaken in these roles will be carried out under the BBSRC grant "Modelling to inform interventions during Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza outbreaks in Great Britain" (BB/X016137/1). The postdoctoral researchers will be expected to conduct research both independently and collaboratively with other members of the group at Oxford and elsewhere. They are expected to provide informal mentorship of doctoral students in the group. These positions are well-suited to researchers with strong modelling and computational skills, and provide the opportunity for substantial positive real-world impact.

Responsibilities

The successful candidates will be expected to:

- Manage own academic research and administrative activities. This involves small scale project management and co-ordinating multiple aspects of work to meet deadlines.
- Adapt existing and develop new research methodologies and materials. Specifically, the candidates will be expected to develop mathematical models of avian influenza transmission in Great Britain, building on previous work by the Oxford-Warwick-Liverpool-UEA-APHA collaborative team.
- Prepare working theories and analyse qualitative and/or quantitative data from a variety of sources, reviewing and refining theories as appropriate. The candidates will be expected

to parameterise the models that they develop using real-world data and use the models to test control interventions.

- Collaborate in the preparation of research publications and contribute towards ensuring that the models developed are usable by policy colleagues in future outbreaks.
- Present papers at conferences or public meetings.
- Act as a source of information and advice to other members of the group on methodologies or procedures.
- Represent the research group at external meetings/seminars, either with other members of the group or alone.
- Carry out collaborative projects with colleagues in partner institutions and research groups. The researchers will have opportunities to interact with project team researchers at other UK universities and the UK government's Animal and Plant Health Agency.

It is the policy of the Mathematical Institute to give all PDRAs the opportunity to teach, where the conditions of the grant allow this, and to require teaching if there is a departmental need. Such teaching, if undertaken, will not exceed 3 hours per week for 24 weeks of the year and additional remuneration will be paid. It will normally be delivered as classes, but it might also involve giving lectures or college tutorials.

Selection criteria

Essential selection criteria

The successful candidates will be expected to meet the following criteria:

- Have, or be close to completing, a PhD in mathematical biology or a related discipline.
- Possess sufficient specialist knowledge in the discipline to work within established research programmes.
- Ability to manage own academic research and associated activities.
- Previous experience of contributing to publications/presentations.
- Ability to contribute ideas for new research projects.
- Ability to use real-world data to inform models of biological systems using appropriate mathematical or statistical techniques.
- Experience of working both independently and collaboratively.
- Excellent communication and interpersonal skills, including the ability to write for publication, present research results, and represent the research group at meetings with external partners.
- Ability to write computing code in an appropriate programming language for use by others.
- Ability to work to tight deadlines.

Desirable selection criteria

- Experience of infectious disease modelling, including generating clearly evidenced conclusions with real-world relevance.
- Experience of independently managing a discrete area of a research project.
- Experience of writing research articles for publication in an internationally leading journal.

Pre-employment screening

Standard checks

If you are offered one of the posts, the offer will be subject to standard pre-employment checks. Proof of qualifications

These posts specify that a PhD qualification is essential. If you are offered one of the posts, you should therefore be in a position to provide proof of this qualification (or proof of doctoral thesis submission) in advance of your proposed start date, and will be asked to provide the original PhD certificate or transcript as part of the pre-employment checks. If you do not yet have either of these documents, you should provide an academic reference confirming submission of the thesis or that the qualification has been awarded. Failure to present either of these documents in a timely fashion could result in a delayed start, particularly where there is a need to apply for a valid work visa ahead of the appointment.


